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Rheedeia publishes peer reviewed original research papers, reviews and short communications in the field of angiosperm taxonomy. Submission of a manuscript implies that the submitted work has not been published, not accepted or is not under consideration for publication elsewhere.

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The receipt of the manuscript will be acknowledged and the acknowledgement will contain the manuscript number. Once a manuscript is submitted all correspondence regarding the submitted manuscript should refer to the manuscript number. Authors are encouraged to submit names, addresses, telephone and fax numbers and e-mail addresses of 3 or 4 potential referees for a manuscript in their covering letter.

The manuscripts of published papers will not be returned to the authors. Figures and plates can be returned upon request, provided stamped envelopes are sent by the authors for the purpose.

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Papers should be consistently written in British/American English. Authors are advised to submit their texts for linguistic revision to an English language expert, if necessary, prior to submission to *Rheedeia*. The editorial office will inform authors on acceptance, revision or rejection of manuscripts.

Preparation and Organization of Manuscripts: Manuscript should be computer printed and compulsorily double spaced on one side of A4 size paper with at least 3 cm left margin and 2.5 cm right, top and bottom margins. All pages including illustrations and tables should be numbered at upper right hand corner.

Paragraphs need not be indented but they should be triple spaced. Do not begin a sentence with a number; if essential start the sentence spelling out such a number.

Title: The title of the manuscript and names and addresses of the authors should be placed on the first page of the manuscript. Title should be brief, preferably not exceeding 15 words. If plant names are given in the title they should be without author citation. Families of the taxa should be given in parenthesis.

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Main Text: Main text should start on the third page which will also have the title of the article. The text should normally follow the following sequence: Introduction, Methodology, Results, Discussion, Conclusion (if any), Acknowledgements (if any) and Literature Cited. Species should be treated in the following sequence: Nomenclature, description, flowering and fruiting, habitat, specimens examined, distribution, (critical) notes. Foot notes should be avoided. Acknowledgements should appear on a separate page. International System of Units (SI) should be used for all measurements.

Scientific names of genera and species should be given in full with authority when they are cited for the first time. If species names occur repeatedly in the text, the genus name may be abbreviated. Scientific names of taxa should be in italics.

Nomenclature: Latin names should be used in accordance with the latest Code (Melbourne Code, 2012).

Diagnoses and Description: Description of a species should follow the style and pattern appeared in *Rheedea* 24(2), 2014.

Citation of Type: It should be as: *Typus:* INDIA, Kerala, Thiruvananthapuram district, Kurisumala, 17 March 1993, Mohanan 11313 (Holotypus, TBGT; Isotypii, K, MH).

Keys: Bracketed, dichotomous keys should be used. Each couplet should be identified by a number and between couplets space should be provided. Please donot format the key; provide it in the simple layout.

- eg. 1. Pseudobulbs very small, < 0.5 cm long or inconspicuous ... **2**
1. Pseudobulbs well developed, > 10 cm long ... **3**
 2. Leaves > 10 cm long with distinct petioles; flowers many, on a spike ... **B. apodum**
 2. Leaves < 3 cm long, without distinct petioles; flowers solitary, borne directly on the rhizome ... **B. clandestinum**

Synonyms: Nomenclatural synonyms should be arranged chronologically after basionym irrespective of their rank. The references cited with correct names, basionyms and synonyms should be avoided from 'Literature Cited' unless it is cited in the text. Pattern of citation should be the same throughout the text.

Citation of Specimens: Specimens should be cited country-wise (in capital letters) alphabetically and within the country in the sequence of region if any, state (in bold font), locality, co-ordinates, altitude, date, collector's name (in Italics), collection number and acronym of herbarium in parenthesis. Mark the herbarium specimen examined/studied with an exclamation (!) against the acronym of the herbarium, e.g. INDIA, **Kerala**, Idukki district, Rajarnala, 24.5.1975, *K. Vivekananthan* 1235 (CAL!, MH!); Palakkad district, Karasuriyama, 12.8.1978, *J. Joseph* 2376 (Holotype, CAL!).

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images of the types of the most allied taxa they mention in the paper to authenticate the novelty. This is also needed for papers that deal with new status or new combinations. New reports for states are not considered for publication.

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Acknowledgements: All acknowledgements should be under one title and placed after the main text. They should be for specific reasons, very brief and as far as possible devoid of adjectives.

Literature Cited: References to articles and books should be limited to published works, work in press or theses and dissertations cited in the paper. References should be listed in alphabetical order. Ensure before submission of manuscripts that all references cited in the text are listed under 'Literature Cited'. Following style and pattern should be adhered to while listing references under 'Literature Cited'.
